Men's Sheds Canada: Working Shoulder to Shoulder to Support the Mental Health and Wellbeing of Older Men / Travailler côte à côte pour soutenir la santé mentale et le bien-être des hommes âgés

Men's Sheds originated in Australia out of the recognition of the need for innovative strategies to address the mental health and social wellbeing of older men. Men's Sheds are community-based organizations that provide a friendly environment where men can work on meaningful projects, alleviate loneliness, find a sense of community and purpose, and talk about their problems. In the Men's Sheds movement, the adage "Men don't talk face to face, they talk shoulder to shoulder" is often expressed.

In Canada, the Men's Sheds movement is growing and there are over 120 sheds. Men's Sheds Canada (MSC) is a not-for-profit voluntary association of Men's Sheds from across Canada, where the power resides in the local shed. MSC supports the mental health and wellbeing of older men through education, advocacy, purposeful engagement and community service initiatives involving Men's Sheds.

Environmental scans have identified the lack of research or government policy relating specifically to older men's health and wellbeing in Canada. Countries such as Australia, Scotland and Ireland have well-developed policies for men, recognizing Sheds as social wellbeing investments. Research is needed in Canada to validate the health needs of older men, the effectiveness of Sheds in meeting some of those needs, and the development of government policy to support men's mental health and wellbeing.

This workshop will begin with presentations about Men's Sheds in Canada, how sheds can support the mental health and wellbeing of older men, and current Canadian research on sheds and knowledge gaps. Participants will then have the opportunity to comment on the direction of MSC's research strategy and to offer their perspectives on the challenges and opportunities for older men's health and wellbeing research.

Le mouvement Men's Sheds a été fondé en Australie, sur la base du besoin reconnu de stratégies novatrices pour assurer la santé mentale et le bien-être social des hommes âgés. Les organismes Men's Sheds sont des « remises » communautaires qui offrent aux hommes âgés un environnement accueillant, où ils peuvent travailler à des projets gratifiants, soulager leur solitude, éprouver un sentiment de communauté et parler de leurs problèmes. Dans le mouvement Men's Sheds, on entend souvent la devise « Les hommes ne parlent pas face à face; ils parlent côte à côte ».

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Le mouvement Men's Sheds est en croissance au Canada, où on compte plus de 120 établissements. Men's Sheds Canada (MSC) est une association bénévole sans but lucratif qui regroupe des établissements autonomes dans diverses régions du pays. MSC soutient la santé mentale et le bien-être des hommes âgés par l'éducation, la défense des droits, l'engagement volontaire et les initiatives de service communautaire.

Au Canada, les analyses de milieux sociaux ont révélé le manque d'études ou de politiques gouvernementales spécifiquement axées sur la santé et le bien-être des hommes âgés. Des pays comme l'Australie, l'Écosse et l'Irlande disposent de politiques détaillées pour les hommes, et reconnaissent le réseau Men's Sheds comme un investissement dans le bien-être social. Des recherches sont nécessaires au Canada pour déterminer les besoins de santé des hommes âgés, valider l'efficacité des établissements MSC dans la réponse à certains de ces besoins, et promouvoir l'élaboration de politiques gouvernementales visant à soutenir la santé mentale et le bien-être des hommes.

Cet atelier commencera par des présentations sur l'association Men's Sheds Canada, montrant comment ces « remises » peuvent soutenir la santé mentale et le bien-être des hommes âgés, et répertoriant les travaux de recherche et les lacunes de savoir actuelles à ce sujet au Canada. Les participants auront ensuite l'occasion d'émettre des commentaires sur l'orientation de la stratégie de recherche actuelle de MSC, et d'exprimer leurs points de vue sur les défis et les possibilités dans le domaine de la recherche sur la santé et le bien-être des hommes âgés.

TREC (Translating Research in Elder Care) is a long-standing, multi-province applied (health services, implementation and improvement science) research program focused on developing practical solutions that continue to system transformation. We focus in particular on developing solutions for improving quality of care and quality of life and end of life for long-term care (LTC) home residents, and quality of work life for staff. For nearly twenty years, TREC's diverse group of researchers has engaged with policymakers, managers, direct care and managerial staff, and people with lived experience to harness opportunities for change in LTC. Our experience has been that an applied research program and reciprocal partnerships are foundational to a transformation agenda.

In this workshop we will discuss the role of partnerships and relationships in achieving change in the LTC sector. Partners from across the LTC sector, including policymakers, operators, directors and managers will share their experiences and insights into how to build and maintain strong and responsive relationships. We will explain how TREC's rigorous research and data management coupled with feedback methods deliver the vision of a better workplace and higher quality resident care – and are essential elements in building trust. Participants will have the opportunity to engage with members of the TREC team, trainees, and sector partners to explore ways to develop and maintain effective relationships for change.

TREC (Translating Research in Elder Care) est un programme interprovincial de recherche appliquée (services de santé, science de la mise en œuvre et de l'amélioration) axé sur le développement de solutions pratiques visant à transformer les systèmes. Nous nous concentrons sur le développement de solutions qui améliorent la qualité des soins et la qualité de la vie et de la fin de vie pour les résidents d'établissements de soins de longue durée (ESLD), ainsi que la qualité des milieux de travail pour le

personnel de ces établissements. Depuis près de vingt ans, le groupe diversifié de chercheurs de TREC collabore avec des décideurs politiques, ainsi qu'avec les dirigeants, gestionnaires et personnels soignants d'établissements de soins de longue durée et avec leurs résidents pour exploiter les possibilités de changement dans ces établissements. Notre expérience montre qu'un programme de recherche appliquée et des partenariats réciproques sont les bases essentielles de tout projet de transformation.

Au cours de cet atelier, nous discuterons du rôle des partenariats et des relations pour la mise en œuvre du changement dans le secteur des soins de longue durée. Des intervenants de l'ensemble du secteur, y compris des décideurs politiques, ainsi que des exploitants, dirigeants et gestionnaires d'établissements rendront compte de leur expérience et présenteront leurs idées sur le développement et le maintien de relations solides et fructueuses. Nous expliquerons comment l'approche rigoureuse de recherche et de gestion des données de TREC, conjuguée à ses méthodes de rétroaction, favorisent un climat de confiance et permettent de réaliser la vision d'un meilleur milieu de travail et d'une prestation de soins de plus haute qualité.
